


KI4DMC: Elmer Help Needed

I have acquired a working Realistic model 20-135 hand-held scanner. It covers selective bands from 30 MHZ thru 960 MHZ. Only problem is the faceplate is missing which labels all of the pushbutttons (25) on the front. If anyone has one and could tell me what each button does or better yet, have a manual, please let me know.

K4LXG: How is your IC-751A Doing?

I have had an Icom IC-751A for around 15 years and it has worked perfectly during this span of time to now. A couple of days ago I was on 75-meters (3947 KHz.) on the Virginia Sideband Net when the frequency display changed from the displayed frequency to all zeros and would not receive or transmit. A couple of times the frequency flashed back and it would operate but then it would go back to the zeros and the loss of the transmit/receive functions. It has the built-in AC power supply, by the way. I tried it on an external 12-volt, 35-amp. AC power supply and found no change. I checked the memory battery and it is still above 3 volts. I also unplugged and replugged most of the connectors on the boards in case a connection had oxidized or corroded. I downloaded servicing data and schematics but they are of poor quality. My first suspect is an electrolytic capacitor having dried out and/or shorted. It acts as if the clock/master oscillator/CPU/phase-locked loop/whatever has failed. Indicator lights on the buttons/controls still function and it switches between transmit and receive but with no RF output or reception.

I was checking info on the internet regarding any problems with the '751A and it mentions one problem being that the trimmer capacitors being made, in that vintage radio, of a plastic that deteriorates with time and all these trimmers need to be replaced as they fail with time. It could be that the problem I have is not related but has anyone had a problem with a '751 like I describe or with the trimmers going bad and/or having to be replaced? I am debating on whether to repair it myself, send it in for repairs or "trash it". Replacing these capacitors, providing they can still be obtained, will require a complete alignment of the entire transceiver also. Otherwise it is in excellent shape and condition.

I will very much appreciate it if you will contact me regarding any problems or experiences you may have had with a '751A in your past or can add anything further.

Scouting Around: Help Needed for VARA Public Service Event on May 8

Greetings to all the amateur radio operators in the Shenandoah Valley and nearby areas. I just wanted to give all a quick update on VARA hosting a table and an operating station at the Scout Expo event happening on May 8th at the "Expo" facility in Fishersville. The event is slated to run from 10 am to 4 pm. We will be able to do set up the evening before which will probably be necessary.

Scout Expo is a scouting show put on by all the units in the regional Stonewall Jackson Area Council (SJAC). SJAC is the regional scouting unit compromised of Rockingham, Augusta, Albemarle, Nelson and Rockbridge Counties and the included cities. This includes Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Venture and Explorer Scouting units. Most of the units will be represented at the Scout Expo showing off their unit and some aspect of scouting. Individuals attending Scout Expo will have the opportunity to walk around and learn about scouting (all phases), see how scouting works and learn much about all aspects of scouting. Community organizations (commercial and non commercial) supportive of scout have also been invited to present at Scout Expo. This will help the scouts and their families learn more about their organizations and give the organizations a chance to present themselves to scouting & the general public.



VARA participation in the Scout Expo is a chance to show off what amateur radio is and how it fits into scouting. Communication has always been part of scouting skills. Boys at one time even had the opportunity to learn Morse code in earning a boy scout rank. Amateur Radio now is represented by Radio Merit Badge, Jamboree on the Air (in October), suggested scout operating frequencies and similiar. Many scout dads and granddads are ham operators. This goes for the moms and grandmoms also. This is a chance to show off amateur radio and possibly influence some interested or curious scouts into becoming or someday becoming amateur radio operators.

Help will be needed during the Saturday event to demonstrate operation, help scouts operate third party style, and just talk about amateur radio in all its variety. Help will also be needed the evening before to help set up a raise-able tower to mount wire antennas from. Friday evening Clint - KB40LM is going to park his operating trailer/tower base behind the EXPO building where some outdoor scouting activity will take place. We will be trying to park it against the base of the hill behind EXPO and put wires up the hill. This should give us a good outdoor operating area, plus we will have an indoor table for information, contact point, sending people out to the trailer etc. We will be able to do some types of operating from inside (2 m, 440, anything computer based etc.). We will hopefully be stationed near one of the back doors and can put an appropriate antenna out side also. Communication with the operating trailer can be via two meters.



As this is a fund raising event for the Council and for individual scouting units all who enter the EXPO whether helping or just viewing will need to pay a ticket price. Tickets are \$2.00 if bought in advance or \$3.00 at the main entrance. The club has offered to reimburse any VARA member who comes to help during the day on Saturday. I will try to have tickets for sale at the \$2.00 price at the next meeting. I will of course be trying to get help for Friday evening and for the Saturday event.

Panasonic RF-220 Receiver: Asking \$100

Introduced by Panasonic to the shortwave community around 1976, the RF-2200 was certainly a marvel of achievement for its day, and could very well be the best analog portable ever made. This radio still commands high respect today and can easily fetch anywhere between \$150 to \$200 on ebay in good working condition. You're getting it for a steal if you are lucky enough to find one of these gems at a flea market or yard sale for \$100 or less. This unit is in like new condition with original manual.

This is a receiver which offers the combined advantages of good solid construction along with high quality specs and great features. Being no slouch to size and weight, the RF-2200 is built around a heavy duty plastic body measuring 12" x 4" x 7½" and it weighs in at a hefty 6¼ lbs without batteries. Its tuning range covers 8 selectable bands which include, the medium wave BC band 520 to 1600 KHz, FM band 88 to 108 MHz, and shortwave frequencies 3.8 to 28 MHz. It features an analog frequency



scale matched together with a manual rotary dial. Accurate and reliable tuning is accomplished with a set of 125kHz and 500kHz calibration markers. The radio also features a BFO which provides adequate reception for SSB / CW signals, selectable fast and slow tuning speeds, selectable wide and narrow bandwidth, RF gain control, separate bass and treble controls, plus good illumination for tuning and signal meter.

All of these features on the RF-2200 are further enhanced by a receiver having

excellent sensitivity along with audio that delivers a full rich

sound. This is a radio that is a genuine pleasure to use...both for beginners and seasoned users alike! The March of Dimes organization would like to thank those hams who provided communication at this years walk in Harrisonburg. Everything went well.





Can You Work the New Repeater?

Can you work the new repeater from your QTH? Will your mobile radio hit it? The repeater's output is 146.865, with a minus-0.600 MHz. offset, and the repeater requires a 179.9 Hz PL tone.

This repeater is located several miles south of Route 50 a few miles west of Winchester, and appears to have good coverage into the northern parts of Rockingham County, as well as hilltop areas in and around Harrisonburg. We have even had reports from Fishersville and high points near Staunton. Check it out, and get on the air!

MARA members who have seen Jay's callsign cap up close and in person know that he could certainly use a new one.



In summary, he said Angie will continue to hold the Day Room reservation for PVARC on the first Friday of each month even though we are now meeting at PMH and Brown's Restaurant on alternate months. It was generally agreed that having the Day Room reserved gives the club a "back-up" in the event Brown's cannot accommodate us because of a schedule conflict.

The Secretary/Treasurer's Report was given by Sparky KD4KL. The minutes of the March 5th meeting were approved as published in The Monitor. A spreadsheet showing income from dues, and payments made in the past 30 days was handed to the President. Cash in PVARC's "Strong-Box" shows a balance of \$337.00. Sparky noted that a cash expenditure of \$60.00 will be made after the meeting to Dave K4DPF for costs associated with reservation of the 2010 ARRL Field Day pavilion at Lake Arrow Head.

The Emergency Preparedness Committee Report was presented by Dave K4DPF. He announced that next Thursday (April 8th) a training exercise will be held at the Charlottesville Regional Hospital Coordinating Center to test communications with and

without amateur radio backup. He also noted that our own facility, Page Memorial Hospital, could use a few more volunteer operators. He is willing to train (or re-train) any interested PVARC member – just give him a call. Mark reminded the members that the Luray EOC still has a requirement to man their station on Sunday nights, and that while he is willing, additional help is needed to meet this requirement. Dave commented that not all the computer issues have been resolved, and the Luray EOC still needs to obtain a computer with a Windows98 operating system.

Widows Assistance Program: Sparky KD4KL reported that over \$5,000 in equipment has been sold from the KA4LER estate and passed on to the widow of Moe. He has set up a table this evening to display the remaining 9 items yet unsold. He asked that anyone attending a hamfest this year and willing to display/sell these items to contact him. The one "high value" commercial SGC PowerTalk HF/SSB transceiver might be of interest to a MARS member, or someone in the boating community. (It was suggested that perhaps e-bay would be a good outlet for this item!) Two items were purchased by Bob KJ4HFU from the display table: Item 28 – Palomar PT-340 "Tuner-Tuner" and, Item 67 – Ramsey CT-70 portable frequency counter.



Dave K4DPF led a discussion on the upcoming 2010 Field Day. He reiterated that PVARC would once again have a 1-A category station. The main emphasis would be to garner enough support from the membership to run the station over the full period. We would use the same equipment as last year, provided by the same individuals (spread sheet list provided). The intent is to "keep it simple" using the KISS approach. No GOTA station this year. Might consider a QRP station (need a volunteer). Need one or two good CW ops (ditto). The same logging software program will be used. The Secretary will handle PR with the Courier, and Dave will invite Gene/Angie as before. Again, main emphasis is maximum participation by PVARC members – plan on coming up to Lake Arrow Head and having lot's of fun! Dave was given \$60 to cover the Field Day site deposit.

Under Old Business: Geoffrey WD4LYO spoke to some of the issues that the Web Site sub-committee are dealing with, e.g., potentially using an OXO server on the ComCast network and ideas from a recent Monitor article. He, along with Dave K4DPT and Carol KA4LAF have met a couple times, but not recently since his XYL is in the hospital. He expects to continue his work and report on their joint activities as they evolve.

New Business: It was suggested that the club call sign should be added to Geoffreys' original artwork and possibly sent to QRZ as part of a potential club photo. The Secretary said he had retained the original artwork and would return it to Geoffrey.
